Margaret Klem, was 30-year public servant

Medical-economics expert and lawyer

Margaret Coyne Klem, a former Rochester lawyer whose public service career as an expert in the field of medical economics lasted more than 30 years, died Monday at Strong Memorial Hospital of pneumonia. She was 88.

-Miss Klem had been a resident

of Conesus Lake Nursing Home in Livonia, Livingston County, for 11/2 years.

Born in Webster, she graduated from the University of Rochester in 1918 with a bachelor's degree in English.

From 1918 to 1924, she worked in the Rochester law office of her uncle, the late Smith O'Brien, while studying for her law degree at UR. She also taught Americanization classes for foreign-born adults at the university's evening

After being accepted to the bar in 1924, she practiced law in Rochester with O'Brien and McSweeney' for three years.

She then undertook a five-year study of family expenditures for medical care for the Commission

on the Cost of Medical Care, an organization sponsored by a group of major private foundations.

In 1931, she began postgraduate studies in economics at the University of Vermont. She later continued her studies at George Washington University, receiving her master's degree in economics in 1940.

Miss Klem began her career in public service under the Roosevelt administration in 1934 with the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, where she worked as an urban relief analyst on the administration's research staff. For 15 years after that, she worked for the Social Security Administra-

Former Scout troop leader withdraws guilty plea

LYONS - A former Marion Boy Scout leader yesterday withdrew a guilty plea to sodomy charges entered moments earlier in Wayne County Court after Judge Harold Stiles rejected a 90day sentence proposed by the

man's lawyer.

Alan Dean, 37, of 4005 Buffalo St., was charged with seconddegree sodomy Dec. 21 after a 15year-old Newark youth told a mental health therapist that Dean had coerced him into sexual relations in early 1982.

Dean was leader of Scout Troop

130, sponsored by the United Church of Marion, until the charges were filed.

Dean's lawyer, John Tyo, said the guilty plea was in response to a pretrial agreement worked out with the Wayne County District Attorney's office and the court.

But both Judge Stiles and Wayne County District Attorney Stephen Sirkin denied that an agreement had been worked out

Stiles allowed Dean to withdraw the guilty plea after rejecting the 90-day sentence proposed by Tyo

State Police investigators who investigated the charges said in December that the youth revealed the assault during counseling with a mental health center at an unnamed group home for disturbed youth in Rochester.

The youth formerly lived in Marion and was a member of Dean's Scout troop at the time of the incident.

Barry said he was first introduced to sex offenders when he joined the clinic more than a decade ago. They were a sorry lot. and still are," he said.

Not all sex offenders are necessarily the victims of a sexual mental illness, said Barry. A rapist, for example, may be acting out of a hostile desire to humiliate women rather than out of a specific sexual compulsion.

But the "paraphiliac" — the addict of abnormal sexual practices has "recurrent fantasies about deviant sex," Barry said.

These are more than fantasies or erotic imagery that pass through the patient's mind," he added. They have a very strong desire to consummate such fanta-

The New York City program, at the Bronx-Lebanon Hospital. is designed to turn offenders off to those abnormal fantasies, said Dr. Sheldon Travin, director of the hospital's forensic unit and associate director of the hospital's psychiatry department.

Travin said sexual crimes -

There appears to be little doubt that sexual attacks on children create devastating and longlasting effects," he said.

While there have been no published studies analyzing the longterm impact of programs like the one at Bronx-Lebanon. Travin said some unpublished data showed as many as 79 percent of those treated in a similar program went for a year without committing sex offenses.


Travin said the men treated in the program undergo 30 weeks of individual and small group therapy. After being tested to determine what arouses them sexually, they're instructed to make repeated tape recordings in which they narrate the abnormal behavior, then remind themselves of the potential consequences: discovery, arrest, destruction of a marriage, and the shame at being found out.

Barry said he has treated about 25 male sexual offenders over the years with Depo-Provers, a drug that chemically resembles female hormones and helps reduce testosterone, a male hormone, which contributes to the sex drive and sexual development in males.

Secut leader charged

Marion man faces count of sodomy in 1982 incident

MARION — A Boy Scout leader described by the minister of his church as "quite an upstanding person and dedicated citizen" was charged yesterday with sodomy in connection with a series of incidents involving a 12-year-old member of his scouting troop nearly three years ago.

Alan Miles Dean of 4005 Buffalo St., Marion, was arraigned yesterday afternoon in Marion Town Court on a felony charge of second-degree sodomy. Town Justice Paul Bender released Dean without bail and ordered him to appear for further proceedings Jan. 2 pending a grand jury investigation.

Dean, 37, was charged after the youth, now 15, earlier this week confided to a therapist at a Rochester mental therapy center that he had been sexually assaulted at Dean's home early in 1982 while a member of Boy Scout Troop 130 in Marion, said Investigator William Bolling of the state police substation in Williamson.

Therapists are required by law to report such incidents to police "because it's considered child abuse." Boiling said. "The matter was reported to us through the Monroe County Department of Social Services."

The unidentified youth, who lives with his family in Newark, lived in Marion during the spring of 1982 when the reported incidents took place, Bolling said.

Bolling said the youth was referred to the Rochester therapy center, a group home that he wouldn't name, for treatment of be-

gree sexual abuse in September 1973, according to the Monroe County district attorney's office. In October 1973, he was sentenced to six months in the Monroe County Jail after pleading guilty to seconddegee sexual abuse in connection with the charges. The district attorney's office had no details on events that led to the 1973 charges.

Roy Clark, senior district executive of the Finger Lakes Council of the Boy Scouts of America, said last night that the charge against Dean is "devastating."

Clark said Dean has been a scout leader "for a number of years," but he didn't know how many.

Clark said the local scouting council doesn't routinely investigate leaders for a history of sexual offenses or other criminal activities unless there's reason to suspect the individual.

David Park, general counsel for the Boys Scouts of America at the organization's headquarters in Irving. Texas, said the national agency doesn't require an investigation of the 1.3 million local scout leaders in the nation.

"There's no easy way for us to know whether someone has done something like this in the past." Park said. "After the fact, if they've done something while involved with scouting, then we put them on our confidential file."

Park said it's up to local councils and sponsoring organizations to investigate individuals who apply to become scouting leaders.

Dean's scout troop is sponsored by the United Church of Marion.

The Rev. Heidi Fuller, pastor of 3 the church, said last night that she was shocked to learn of the charges against Dean and of his prior conviction on sexual abuse charges.

"This is very difficult to hear." Fuller said.

Fuller said Dean is an active member of the church and was a resident of the community and leader of the scout troop when she moved to Marion and was appointed pastor in the summer of 1981. She said the church's only function as sponsor of the troop is to provide a meeting place for scouting activities.

"I have no understanding that we either select or approve of the leadership," she said.
